SNOWFLAKES, FINGERPRINTS AND YOU!

Did you ever see pictures of snowflakes? There are books and internet sites loaded with nothing but picture after picture of snowflakes. They are some of God's most beautiful creations. The astounding fact is that there are no two snowflakes alike. Do you realize what a tall order this is? After researching the subject, I've learned that somewhere in the neighborhood of 10 to the 24th power of snowflakes fall each year. We have a machine that takes the print, stores it in a national database and instantly checks the print against any unsolved case or unidentified prints. This is the AFIS system you here about on the CSI shows. One thing I learned that didn't change is that of all the people in the world, (6,581,843,250 as of 1-3-06) no two people have the same fingerprints. Multiply that by 20 digits per person, including toes. Fingerprints are so unique, (pardon my grammar) that the AFIS system only needs six similar points to make a positive match.

This brings us to you. Do you see to what lengths God went to make the universe? Did you ever think that God would go to so much trouble to make snow? How about the grains of sand or water molecules, insects and animals as numerous as the blades of grass! After seeing the complexity of this world is it so hard to know that He has numbered the hairs on your head? Thoughts from one of the Spiritual Directors...

At Emery Chapel we have for some time now been gathering in prayer circles and lifting up to God those concerns on our hearts and on the list of prayer concerns in the bulletin. I hear one person pleading for healing, another for a child still another for a family yet another for comfort and peace. When I hear the sacred sounds of people lifting their voices to God in heartfelt prayer, I find myself transported to another realm of being, standing in the very presence of God who hears and answers prayer. It isn't a sound of wild emotion like the priests of Baal on the mountain with Elijah but a sweet sound of people with quiet confidence in the goodness of God, freely raising to Him the deepest desires and praises of their hearts. This calling out to God is not anything new. It is as old as humanity. In the years after Adam and Eve's generation, in the days of Seth and Cain, the Bible says: "At that time men and women began to call on the name of the Lord." (Genesis 4: 26)

Think about that. Adam and Eve knew and spoke with God face to face but then came the fall and separation from God. Murder and vengeance swept the knowledge of God from people's minds. Lamech told his wives "I killed a man for wounding me, a young man who attacked me. If Cain is avenged seven times, for Lamech, it's seventy-seven!" Satan had the upper hand. But the grace and love of God would not leave us alone. Into the hearts of a faith-filled few came this fresh breath of prayer and fellowship with God. God's first people weren't called Jews or Christians but "Men and women who called on the name of the Lord." God gave to some people the faith that if you called out to God in your need, He would answer; He would intervene in your situation. I can imagine one woman coming to another in deep distress and that other woman saying: "Did you know that if you prayed to the one true God that He will answer and help you? He did more than just make everything; He cares about you and me. He understands and will help you. Why don't we pray to Him now?"

When the Hebrews used the word "To call" it actually meant: "To cry out". That kind of prayer touches the heart of God. Charles Spurgeon once said that: "The best style of prayer is that which cannot be called anything but a cry." God Himself promises us: "Call to me and I will answer you.." (Jeremiah 33:3) Moses at the end of his life remarked: "What other nation is so great as to have their gods with them the way our Lord is near to us whenever we pray to Him? (Deuteronomy 4:7) The Hebrews were a downright backward people: newly released from slavery, they had none of the horses, chariots and iron weapons of those nations around them. But they had what no one else had: a God who would hear and answer their prayers. As long as Israel called on God, victory was theirs. If they failed to call on Him, defeat was sure to follow. Satan's plan was to do just that; persuade the people that calling on God will do no good. They must trust to their own energy and resources. What God wants most is our attention and devotion. When the street people asked Peter what they needed to do, he told them one thing: "Call on the name of the Lord and you will be saved." God promises us: "Call upon me in the day of trouble. I will deliver you and you will honor me." (Psalm 50:15) When we come to God in times of trouble and need, He meets those needs and fresh praise pours forth from us. We know that God has done these things.

A voice sounded in the sanctuary a few days ago: "Is anybody here?" I was in my office and went out to see who was speaking. An African American man was standing there and told me was on his way home to Columbus from visiting a sick relative in Indianapolis. His van needed a new alternator or he would never make it home. He had already spent one night out in the cold. I found I had enough to give him for the balance of the part but not for the core charge of \$50. I called Urban Light and they said they had no more money. I prayed and asked God what to do and felt led to send the man up to Urban Light anyway, promising to pay the balance if he could come up with the \$50. He met a man outside Urban Light who simply handed him the \$50 saying he didn't want to see him spend another night out in the cold. When the man came back he said: "I just can't figure why that man just gave me the money." I told him to glorify God because He had provided in answer to prayer. I also told Him that if he went to a church regularly he would know a lot more about all that God could and would do. The funny thing is that when I called his home number in Columbus to see if he had arrived safely at first I just got his answering machine whose intro ended with him saying "God bless you." If we come to God in prayer and expectation this will no longer be just a common, empty phrase. We will realize just how much God will bless us and experience the victories He wants to win in and through our lives.

Is there some need in your life? Is there someone whose physical health is in danger? A son, daughter, wife, husband or friend who is lost? A pastor or church that is struggling? A person at a crossroads in life?

This new year give prayer a bigger, more consistent part in your life. You may not be able to make a great change. However even a small change is so much better than none. God will bless your fellowship with Him so much more than you expect. And there is someone else out there who will be so glad you did.
